


2015-16 DCOC Annual Report

To the Los Angeles Community College District Community and those it serves:

Continuing to fulfill its commitment to the voters and taxpayers of the Los Angeles Community College District, the District Citizens' Oversight Committee (DCOC) offers this annual report on the status of the Propositions A, AA, and Measure J bond program for the fiscal year of 2015/2016 (July 1, 2015 - June 30, 2016). As the outgoing Chair of the DCOC and after serving on the committee for the past six years, I would like to acknowledge the tremendous amount of work which has taken place in order to construct and renovate numerous buildings at all nine of the colleges and the satellites which make up the Los Angeles Community College District (LACCD). We hope you will find this report both interesting and informative. This is truly an enormous effort and without the support from various groups including students, faculty, staff, administrators, and most importantly the taxpayers, this program would not exist.

Proposition A was approved by the voters in 2001. Proposition AA was approved by the voters in 2003. Measure J was approved by the voters in 2008. Most of the funds for Propositions A and AA have now been expended and many of the Measure J projects have been designed and are either currently under construction or completed.

During my tenure we have seen many improvements in the way the bond program has been managed. The DCOC has strengthened their oversight drawing on the members' experience in both the construction industry and educational arena. The bond program, now in operation for over 15 years, has reached a level of maturity. Standardized processes and procedures are in place which has led to an increased level of accountability. We would encourage you to take the time to review the following report.

Since the inception of the bond program a major responsibility of the committee has been to review how the taxpayer dollars are being spent. The committee takes this responsibility seriously. It is important to note this past year that the bond financial auditors and bond performance auditors reported to the committee that all funds audited in the fiscal year of 2014/2015 have been used in accordance with Proposition 39 and in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to the financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. In addition, the District has self-imposed additional cost guidelines called "Cost Principles" and the audit teams found no exceptions to these additional requirements. Copies of these audits are available on the building program website.

During the past year the District has made many changes in the bond program website, www.buildlaccd.org.

These changes have made it easier to navigate and search the website thus increasing the transparency of the bond program. Please visit the website where you will find information about the DCOC located under the oversight tab. This site also includes dashboard reports, financial and performance audits, and DCOC agendas and minutes. While at www.buildlaccd.org please explore the rest of the site where you will find additional information about the bond program accomplishments, awards, leadership, and projects.

Over the past couple of years the DCOC has started holding their meetings at the various colleges and satellites. This has given DCOC members the opportunity to tour many of the completed projects. If you have not visited the colleges recently, we would encourage you to do so where you can see firsthand the transformation which is occurring. A lot of the bungalow and modular buildings are being replaced with permanent state of the art structures. While at the college take the time to visit with some of the students you will find that they are excited about the improvements which have occurred.

It has been an honor to have served as the Chair of the DCOC for the past three years. The experience of seeing the buildings open and the students using the buildings has been extremely rewarding. I would like to thank all of the committee members for their participation and the district staff for their support. As a member of the committee I can say with confidence that we have worked hard to insure the taxpayer dollars are being spent as the voters intended providing collegiate buildings which support student success.

ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Over the past seventy-eight years the Los Angeles Community
College District (LACCD) has served as the educational
institution to more than three million students. Affordable,
accessible and practical, the LACCD offers opportunity to all.
The doors are wide open for a diverse student population eager
for skills, knowledge and upward mobility. LACCD educates
almost three times as many Latino students and nearly four
times as many African-American students as all of the University
of California campuses combined. Eighty percent of LACCD

students are from underserved populations. The LACCD serves approximately 250,000 students a year in 40 cities and communities across an area of 882 square miles. LACCD is, by many measures, the largest community college district in the United States. The LACCD is composed of nine comprehensive colleges and a central office, which together employ roughly 4,400 full-time and part-time faculty, and more than 5,400 full-time and part-time administrative and support staff, including about 1,800 part-time student workers. An elected, sevenmember Board of Trustees, serving four-year terms, governs the LACCD. One student trustee, selected by the students, serves a one-year term beginning on June 1st of every year.

Propositions A, AA and Measure J - District Citizens'
Oversight Committee:

The Board of Trustees for the Los Angeles Community College
District formed the District Citizens' Oversight Committee (DCOC) in
June 2001 to provide a vital link between the District and the
community with respect to implementation of Proposition A funds for
construction and modernization projects within the District. The
Proposition A bond measure totaled \$1.245 billion. The voters
subsequently approved two additional bonds: Proposition AA and
Measure J. Proposition AA bond measure totaled \$980 million and
Measure J bond measure totaled \$3.5 billion. The DCOC consists
of representatives from the local communities. The DCOC
members are appointed for a two year term and can be
re-appointed for a term not to exceed two consecutive terms.

Highlight

On July 2016 the Moody's and Standard & Poor's rating agencies issued the District a bond rating "AA" to "AA+" respectively, which results in savings to taxpayers due to reduced borrowing costs.

Report Covers Fiscal Year 2015-16 (July 1, 2015 - June 30, 2016)

This is the DCOC's formal annual report on bond money generated by Propositions A, AA and Measure J, consistent with the requirements of Proposition 39.

DCOC Establishment, Purpose and Responsibilities

As provided in Education Code section 15278, the District's Citizens' Oversight Committee was established by the Board of Trustees to inform the public concerning the District's expenditure of revenues received from the sale of bonds authorized by the voters on April 10, 2001, May 20, 2003 and November 4, 2008.

The District Citizens' Oversight Committee will provide oversight ensuring that:

- a. bond revenues are expended only for the construction, rehabilitation, or replacement of college facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of college facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for college facilities; and
- no bond revenues are expended for any teacher or administrative salaries or other college operating expenses.


Community Economic Development Program

Through the Project Labor Agreement (PLA), the Build Program and its contractors are guaranteed the skilled labor necessary to execute its capital improvement program. The PLA contains a local worker* hiring component and establishes a pathway to apprenticeship for Los Angeles Trade Tech students (LATTC) that applies to all bond-funded projects.



The College Internship Program works in professional collaboration with Industry Partners to identify internship opportunities and provide students an avenue to engage, learn and pursue STEAM academic pathways and careers in architecture, engineering, construction, construction management, and IT disciplines.

EAST LOS ANGELES COLLEGE PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

Each year, ELAC helps more than 1,000 of its students transfer to the University of California and California State University systems. Forty-seven percent of its students are focused on transferring to a 4-year school while 18 percent are working toward career preparedness. The college's 82-acre campus is located 10 miles east of downtown Los Angeles in suburban Monterey Park.



Performing Arts and Fine Arts Complex - Vincent Price Art Museum

The new 3-building complex houses Theater Arts, Recital Hall, and the Vincent Price Gallery. The design of the buildings conforms to a LEED Certified project requirements and will minimize the life cycle costs and minimize the impact of the building to the environment.



Student Success and Retention Center

The design of the building meets LEED Gold requirements and design features include classrooms, labs, and offices.



Campus Student Center/Book Store Complex

The design of the building meets LEED Gold requirements and design features include cafeteria, bookstore, multi-purpose room, faculty and staff lounges, office space, and health services center.

LACC's math and debate teams are nationally recognized and its theater and cinema-television programs are among the best in the country.
