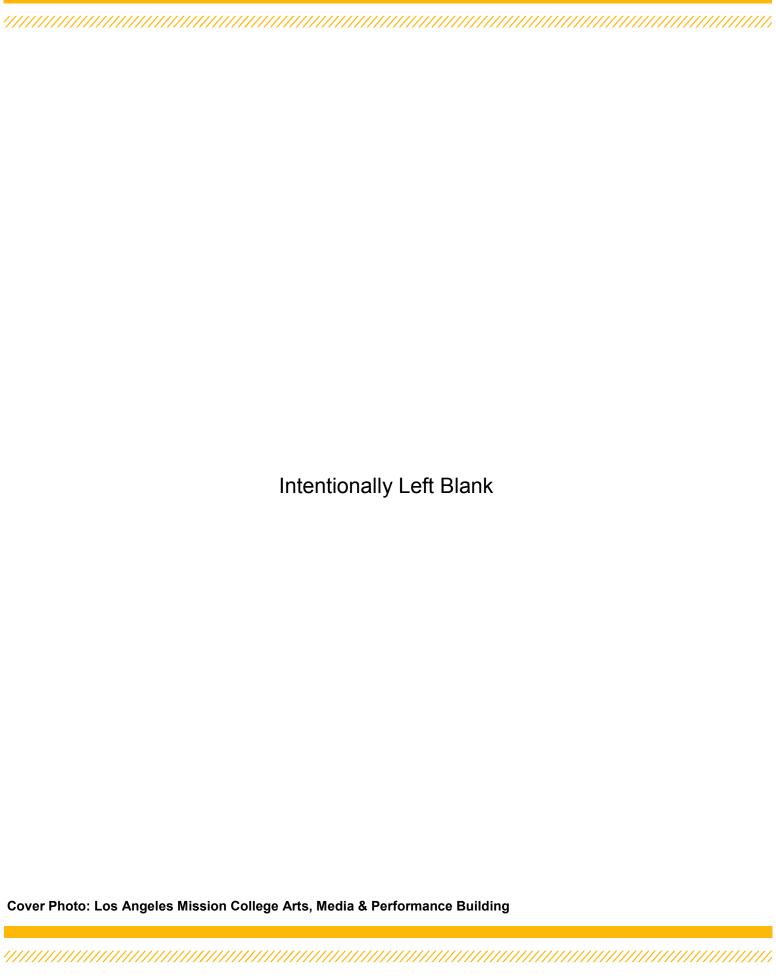

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# To the Los Angeles Community College District Community and those it serves:

Fulfilling its obligation to the Los Angeles Community College District, its building program, and most importantly the voters and taxpayers of the Los Angeles Community College District (LACCD), the District Citizens' Oversight Committee (DCOC) presents this annual report on the status of the Proposition A, AA, Measure J, and Measure CC bond program at the conclusion of the 2017-18 fiscal year (July 1, 2017 – June 30, 2018). The DCOC was established in 2001 with passage of Proposition A. Since inception, the DCOC has been the eyes and ears of the taxpayers for all four bonds to ensure that bond funds are spent appropriately. Since 2001 the voters within the LACCD have passed the four bond measures totaling \$9.025 billion. Approximately \$557 million from other sources including bond interest, state bonds, grants and other sources results in a combined \$9.6 billion building program, the largest community college construction building program in the country. Funds for Propositions A and AA are ninety-nine percent (97%) expended and funds for Measure J are seventy-three percent expended (73%).

Measure CC, the recent bond measure passed in 2016 is in the implementation phase. The goal for this measure aligns with the overall goal for the bond program which is to create first class learning facilities that support current enrollment and increase enrollment in years to come. Measure CC implementation is broken into College Specific Projects and Program Wide Projects. The Categories for College Specific Projects are: 1) Growth in Instructional Space; 2) Modernize Instructional Space; 3) Support Services (Whole Campus Concept); and 4) Support Services (Operations). Program Wide Projects will cover universal needs (e.g. physical security, cyber security, technology, etc.).

The past fiscal year has been a year of transition for the BuildLACCD bond program. At our August 25, 2017 meeting; David Salazar, the new Chief Facilities Executive for the LACCD, was introduced. Mr. Salazar brings over 27 years of facilities planning and design and construction experience. During this past year we've had the opportunity to get to know and work with him closely in our oversight role. In addition, this past year also brought a change in the Program Manager for the BuildLACCD bond program. During the early part of fiscal year 2017-18, Jacobs Project Management Company, became the new Program Manager. As with a program of this size, Jacobs Project Management Company hit the ground running. They have implemented organizational changes with a focus on improving communication and interaction with the nine colleges.

Two important documents that we receive annually and complement our oversight role are the financial and performance audits. The performance audit for Fiscal Year 2016-17 did not identify any significant internal control deficiencies within the context of the audit. The financial audit for Fiscal Year 2016-17 found that the statement of expenditures of bond proceeds were in accordance with United States Generally Accepted Accounting Principles.

Finally, being DCOC chairperson has truly been a rewarding experience, however, I could not do it alone and want to thank my fellow committee members. We take great pride and satisfaction in knowing that LACCD students and staff are receiving new and modernized spaces that support and promote student success. 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### **ABOUT THE DISTRICT**

For nearly 90 years the Los Angeles Community College District (LACCD) has served as the educational institution to more than three million students. Affordable, accessible and practical, the LACCD offers opportunity to all. The doors are wide open for a diverse student population eager for skills, knowledge and upward mobility. LACCD educates almost three times as many Latino students and nearly four times as many African-American students as all of the University of California campuses combined. Eighty percent of LACCD

students are from underserved populations. The LACCD serves approximately 250,000 students a year in 36 cities and communities across an area of 900 square miles. LACCD is, by many measures, the largest community college district in the United States. The LACCD is composed of nine comprehensive colleges and a central office. An elected, seven-member Board of Trustees, serving four-year terms, governs the LACCD. One student trustee, selected by the students, serves a one-year term beginning on June 1st of every year.

#### Propositions A, AA and Measures J, CC - District Citizens' Oversight Committee:

The Board of Trustees for the Los Angeles Community College District formed the District Citizens' Oversight Committee (DCOC) in June 2001 to provide a vital link between the District and the community with respect to implementation of Proposition A funds for construction and modernization projects within the District. The Proposition A bond measure totaled \$1.245 billion. The voters subsequently approved three additional bonds: Proposition AA, Measure J, and Measure CC. Proposition AA bond measure totaled \$980 million, Measure J bond measure totaled \$3.5 billion, and Measure CC bond measure totaled \$3.3 billion. The DCOC consists of representatives from the local communities. The DCOC members are appointed for a two year term and can be re-appointed for a term not to exceed three consecutive terms.

#### Highlight

The Moody's and Standard & Poor's rating agencies issued the District a bond rating "Aa1" to "AA+" respectively, which results in savings to taxpayers due to reduced borrowing costs.

Report Covers Fiscal Year 2017-18 (July 1, 2017 - June 30, 2018)

This is the DCOC's formal annual report on bond money generated by Propositions A, AA and Measures J, CC consistent with the requirements of Proposition 39.

#### DCOC Establishment, Purpose and Responsibilities

As provided in Education Code section 15278, the District's Citizens' Oversight Committee was established by the Board of Trustees to inform the public concerning the District's expenditure of revenues received from the sale of bonds authorized by the voters on April 10, 2001, May 20, 2003, November 4, 2008, and November 8, 2016.

The District Citizens' Oversight Committee will provide oversight ensuring that:

- a. bond revenues are expended only for the construction, rehabilitation, or replacement of college facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of college facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for college facilities; and
- no bond revenues are expended for any teacher or administrative salaries or other college operating expenses.

In 2002 the Los Angeles Community College District Board of Trustees adopted Leadership in Energy (LEED) and Environmental Design rating system. All new buildings and major renovations over 7,500 square and an occupied structure shall minimally be LEED "certified" with a goal of LEED Silver. Additional green initiatives include adding electric vehicle ready parking to new buildings requiring a certain number of parking stations.

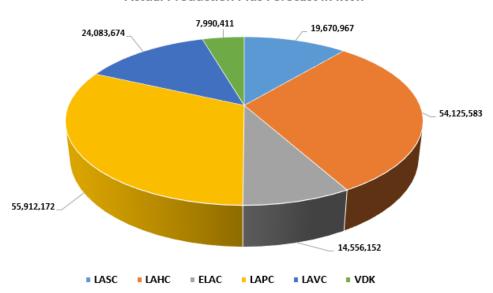

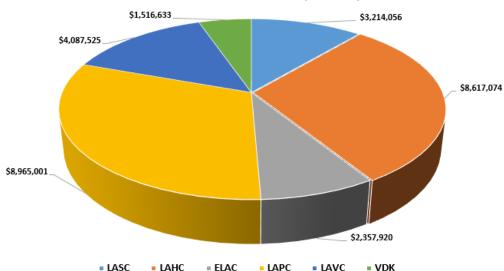
### **SOLAR POWER GENERATION**

The Los Angeles Community College District (LACCD) is a leader in environmentally responsible construction. As part of this movement, the LACCD is generating solar power on its campuses and taking other steps to reduce the colleges' carbon footprint. The LACCD has installed nearly 10 MW (mega-watt) of solar photovoltaic across the District. The LACCD has installed photovoltaic systems at all colleges with the ten largest installations located on the campuses of Harbor College, East Los Angeles College, Pierce College, Southwest College, Valley College, and Van de Kamp Satellite. To date, the LACCD has generated over 68,000,000 kWh (kilowatt-hours) from installed photovoltaic systems. This is equivalent to emissions from nearly 11,000 cars, or electricity use of over 7,600 homes. The LACCD generated nearly 9,000,000 kWh from solar photovoltaic in the last twelve month period, offsetting over \$1.3 million of electricity cost to the colleges. This is equivalent to emissions from over 1,400 cars, or electricity use of nearly 1,000 homes.

### **Community Economic Development Program**

The Los Angeles Community College District (LACCD) Community Economic Development (CED) Program was established by the Board of Trustees to increase participation by local businesses, students, and workers to maximize the economic impact of the \$9.6 billion BuildLACCD Program. The CED Program includes a comprehensive Local Worker Hiring Program (LWHP), Local, Small, Emerging, Disabled, and Veteran (LSEDV) Program, and College Internship Program. Thirty-seven percent of program dollars spent in 2017 went to LSEDV firms. All CED information provided is cumulative since October 2014.

The CED Program is part of the Los Angeles Regional Workforce Manager Transformation Group which is a collaborative effort among public agencies, community-based organizations, and the contracting community to track workers throughout the life cycle of his or her career, and to measure local economic impact as a result of public infrastructure investment. The participating public agencies are creating a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to establish the quidelines for data sharing and developing the technical specification requirements for the next phases of system development, which includes significant input from community partners. Partners for this effort include: LACCD, LA Metro, City of Los Angeles, LAX, LA County, YouthBuild, Emerald Cities Collaborative, Clark Construction,

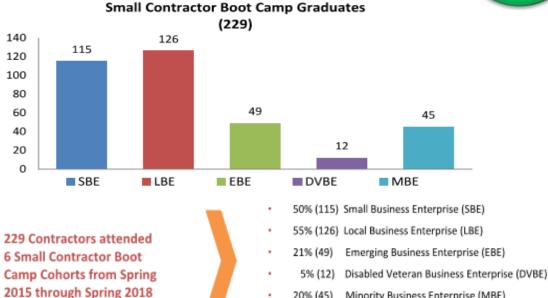

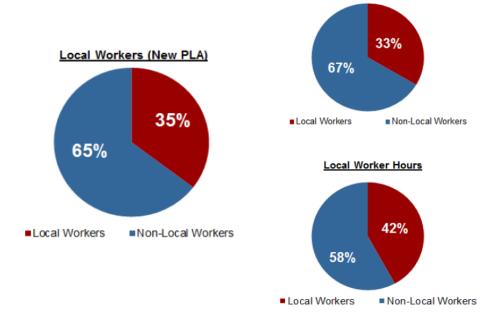

# **Community Economic Development Program**

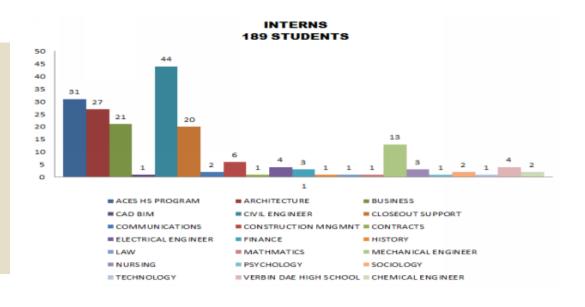
Through the Project Labor Agreement (PLA), the Build Program and its contractors are guaranteed the skilled labor necessary to execute its capital improvement program. The PLA contains a local worker\* hiring component and establishes a pathway to various apprenticeships for Los Angeles Trade Tech students (LATTC) that applies to all bond funded projects.

### EAST LOS ANGELES COLLEGE PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

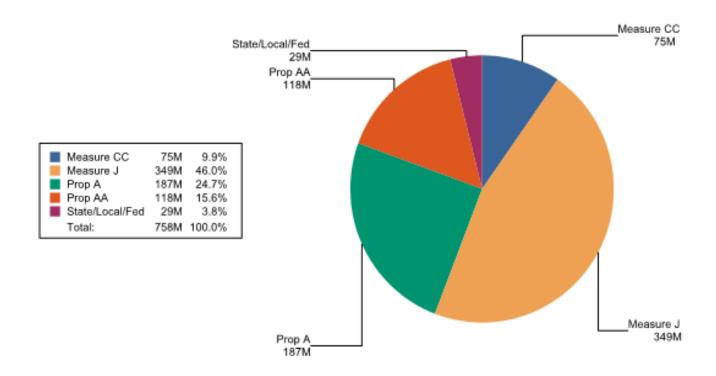


East Los Angeles College (ELAC) has been serving the Monterey Park and East Los Angeles communities since 1945 and has the unique distinction of having the largest student population of all nine LACCD colleges. ELAC has undergone a remarkable renaissance on its main campus. Their current leased satellite campus, in the nearby City of South Gate, will be replaced by the new South Gate Educational Center. Thanks to the voters of Los Angeles and their passage of Propositions A/AA and Measures J/CC, the ELAC campus continues its transformation into a 21st century state-of-the-art educational institution. Openings to date include the 160,000 SF LEED™ Gold Performing Fine Arts Complex consisting of the Vincent Price Museum, the Recital Hall and the Theatre Building; the 57,500 SF LEED™ Silver Bailey Library Building; the 58,000 SF LEED™ Silver Student Services Building; the 40,000 SF Administration Building; the 100,000 SF Technology Center; the 45,000 SF LEED™ Certified Social & Behavioral Sciences Building; 95,000 SF LEED™ Certified Phase 1 Science Career & Mathematics Building and 3-Lecture Hall Buildings; the 39,380 SF LEED™ Gold Campus Student Center Bookstore; the 138,575 SF LEED™ Gold Ernest H. Moreno-Language Arts & Humanities Building; the two multi-story Parking Structures; 1.8 Megawatts of Photovoltaic Array; a new Central Plant, a new campus-wide utility infrastructure system; Stadium East End Zone Terrace; Plant Facilities Complex; and athletic facilities improvement projects including ELAC stadium modernization and new Men's Baseball and Women's Softball Field Concession Building & Field complexes.

ELAC's focus on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) and MESA (Mathematics, Engineering, and Science Achievement) is evident in the 120,000 SF Science Career & Mathematics Complex (SCMC). Finishing the SCMC will complete the east-west campus quad, which also includes the Campus Student Center Bookstore and the recently commissioned Ernest H. Moreno Language Arts and Humanities building - the State of California's largest classroom building.

### LOS ANGELES CITY COLLEGE PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS



Los Angeles City College (LACC) sits on a 49-acre site that once served as UCLA's campus before moving to Westwood. Nearly \$585 million in publicly approved bond funds have transformed LACC into a state-of-the-art learning center in the middle of Los Angeles' urban core. The LACC campus now accommodates learning in the digital age.

LACC's focus on Science, Technology, Engineering, Art + Design and Math – STEAM subjects, is evident in the construction of the new Science and Technology Building housing the college's state-of-the-art science laboratories, smart lecture halls and classrooms.

The award winning LEED Gold™ Student Union has become the center of student activity serving as home for the Associated Student Government and the Student Services Center.

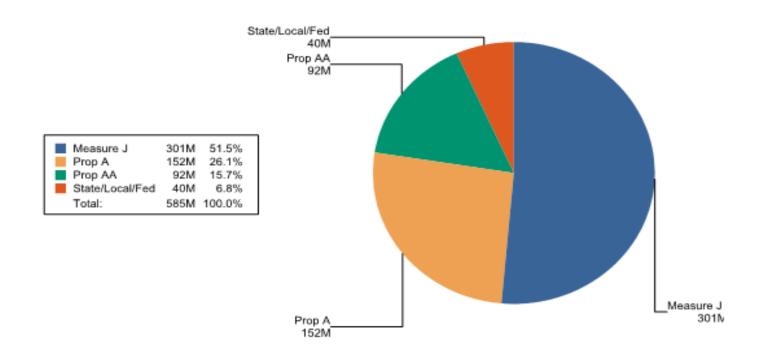
As part of an "Urban Oasis of Learning", LA City College's LEED™ certified Martin Luther King Library is the largest library in the District and provides quality services for students on campus. The three-story library offers various study spaces, including 18 group study rooms, 2 comfortable lounge seating areas, individual study carrels, an entire floor

dedicated to quiet study and configured with large tables, and 2 large computer classrooms. Continuously upgraded technology for students include: 192 computers, 5 ADA stations, 2 special accommodation stations, multiple copier and printer tables, multiple copier and printer stations, and wireless internet access throughout the building.

The newly modernized Music Hall Building maximizes the use of existing space for the Music Department to include a new music Recital Hall, music practice, coaching rooms, classrooms, computer labs, lecture hall, band and orchestra room, office spaces, library, sheet music storage, and music storage. The new LEED™ certified Kinesiology North Building houses the Kinesiology Department with new basketball gymnasium, fitness center, classrooms, offices, locker rooms, multipurpose rooms, and outdoor pool.

### LOS ANGELES HARBOR COLLEGE PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS



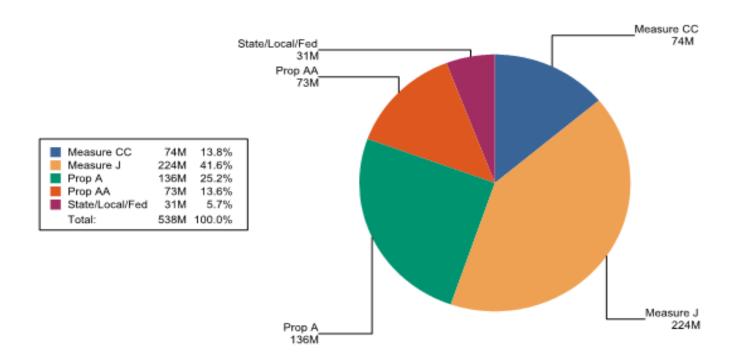
Los Angeles Harbor College's educational programs and support services meet the needs of the diverse communities within the South Bay and the adjacent communities of the Palos Verdes Peninsula, Port of Long Beach, and the cities of Torrance, Carson and Gardena.

LAHC presents a broad range of programs geared toward helping students prepare themselves for life in the 21st Century and offers a variety of programs and services to help its students achieve life goals.

This is an exciting time for Harbor College as it enters the final phase of the upgrades and construction utilizing bond funds from Propositions A/AA and Measure J/CC. These bond programs are responsible for new and upgraded buildings including the new 45,000 GSF Library Learning Resource Center (LLRC) and the LEED™ Platinum Science Complex featuring state-of-the art lecture halls, classrooms, science and computer laboratories, conference and faculty lounge space, and modernization of the Theater Drama Speech building. Currently the new 59,950 GSF Student Union Building is under construction with early steel structure in place. Substantial completion is expected in December 2018. The Campus Wide ADA project has begun construction of barrier removal for ADA compliance across several buildings and sites on campus.

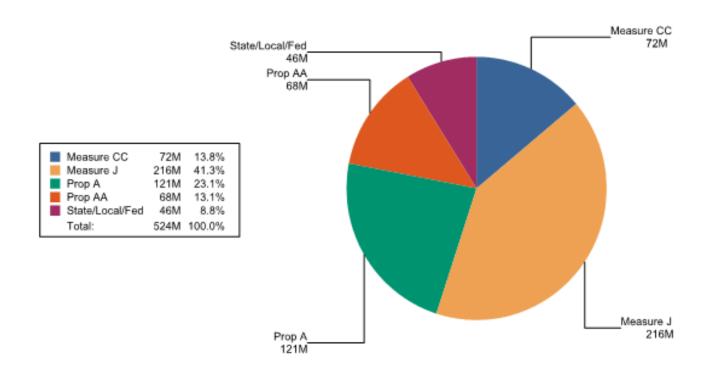

Although it is one the youngest colleges in the Los Angeles Community College District, LAMC is home to some of the most unique and robust educational programs. 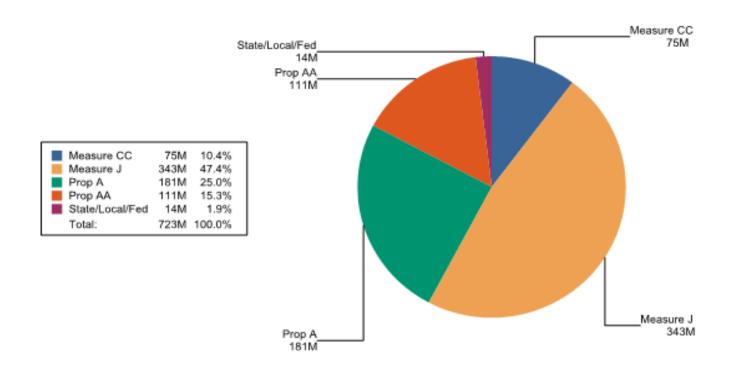

### LOS ANGELES SOUTHWEST COLLEGE PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

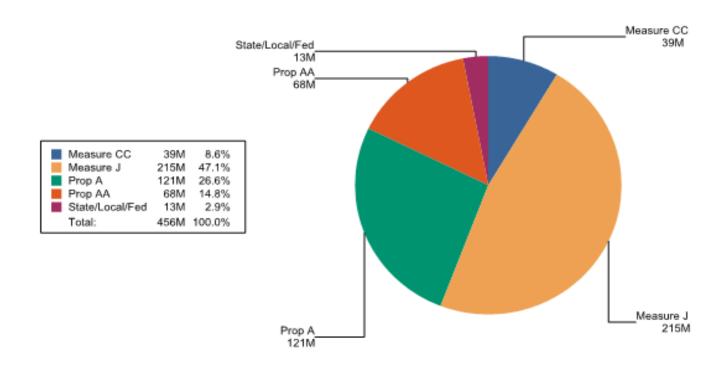


Los Angeles Southwest College's service area consists of 45 square miles that includes parts of the City of Los Angeles, unincorporated sections of the 2nd Supervisorial District in Los Angeles County, as well as portions of Gardena, Hawthorne, and Inglewood. For 50 years, LASC has focused its resources on empowering a diverse student population by helping them achieve their academic and career goals. As a result of projects completed through the BuildLACCD program, the campus has experienced a dramatic transformation in recent years. Notable new facilities include a comprehensive child development center, student bookstore, a football stadium and track and a field house.

The newest building on campus is the School of Career Technical Education building, which serves as a center for the business department, workforce development and corporate relations offices, career center and a variety of shared support space functions. This recently opened building has been awarded Leadership in Energy & Environmental Design (LEED) Platinum status, the highest certification level for green buildings, in part due to its use of energy systems, water conversation approach, sustainable materials and overall indoor environmental quality. LASC's campus is now home to one of the most innovative performing arts facilities in the world - the Little Theater, located in the Cox Building. Theater upgrades included modernized seating, stage, advanced stage lighting and sound controls, as well as new department office space, all designed to expand the creative capacity for students pursuing a career in performance arts. The Cox Building includes the upgraded 9,000 SF Cox Annex housing the offices of the president and administrative services, vice president, as well as the institutional effectiveness, public information and future technology facilities. Additionally, the Cox Building features a new passenger elevator and mechanical shafts that act as a link between the Annex and all five levels of the building, and upgraded heating, ventilation, and air conditioning system connections to the college's Central Plant.

### LOS ANGELES TRADE-TECH COLLEGE PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

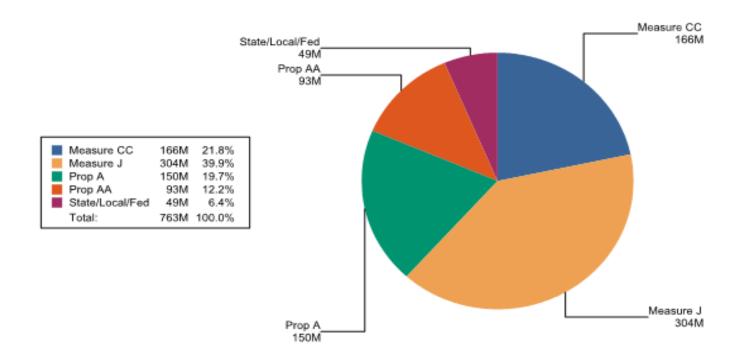

### LOS ANGELES VALLEY COLLEGE PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

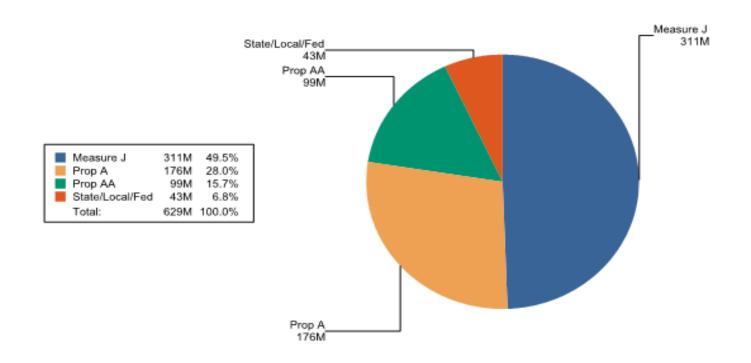


Los Angeles Valley College (LAVC) is located in the heart of Los Angeles's San Fernando Valley. Founded in 1949, LAVC is an urban oasis containing over 1,800 trees and plants. This earned LAVC the first Tree Campus USA designation in California, and earned multiple times since. Over 140 associate degree programs and certificate programs are offered at LAVC. Popular majors include Accounting, Administration of Justice, Biology, Business Management, Child Development, Computer Applications & Office Technology, Engineering, Fire Technology, Liberal Arts & Sciences, Mathematics, Media Arts, Music, Psychology, Registered Nursing, Respiratory Therapy, and Sociology.

The community surrounding LAVC is home to hundreds of movie and television industry professionals and the college embraces these industries into its educational and facility master plans. Currently in design, LAVC will soon be home to the Valley Academic and Cultural Center, which will feature a new two-story, 118,000 SF media and performing arts center including theaters, smart classrooms, labs, and production/control rooms.

Recently completed projects that support student success include the new Library and Academic Resource Center, recognized as one of the San Fernando Valley's largest libraries. Outside of study time, the center of student activity can be found in the new Student Union (Monarch Center and Parking Structure), which features a 66,000 GSF building, bookstore, cafeteria, health center, and other facilities for student functions including a new 1,200 space parking garage. Also completed is the two story 70,000 SF Administration and Career Advancement building, which will provides office space for the college administration and workforce development programs along with 13 new classrooms and a conference center.

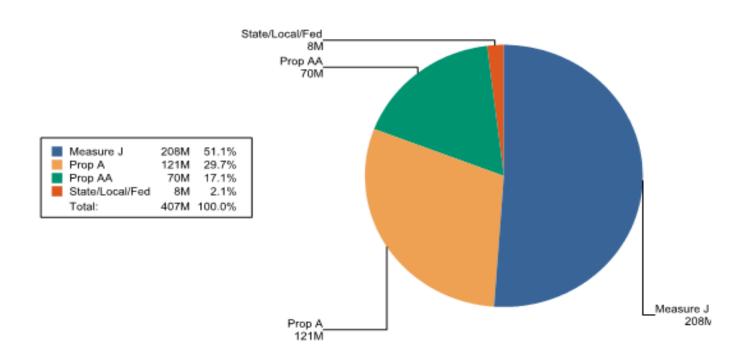
### WEST LOS ANGELES COLLEGE PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS



The \$400 million Building Program at West Los Angeles College (WLAC) is aimed at transforming the campus into a 21st Century educational institution. The goals of WLAC's construction program are to provide facilities that support and enhance the Educational Master Plan, improve outdoor gathering spaces, increase green space, enhance pedestrian access, remove vehicular traffic from the center of Campus, clearly define the campus architectural style and increase public awareness of the Campus. Some of the most notable examples of facilities supporting WLAC's Educational Master Plan are the Science and Math Building with its accredited dental hygiene program, the new General Classroom and Student Services buildings, the Heldman Learning Resource Center Renovation, the new parking structure, the pedestrian mall, and the new entrance to the campus via College Boulevard - a half-mile avenue connecting the campus to Jefferson Boulevard.

Of special note is the college's premier Bachelor of Science in Dental Hygiene. Created as a pilot program, WLAC is one of only 12 community colleges in the state selected to offer a Bachelor of Science degree in Dental Hygiene. Housed in the new Science and Math building, Dental Hygiene students have access to state-of-the art classrooms, lecture halls and laboratories. Linking proximity to movie and television studios, WLAC is in the design phase of Watson Center 2 - the Motion Picture/Television Production Crafts (MPTPC) project. Once completed, Watson Center 2 will consist of a new 16,000 gross square foot facility, which includes a Sound Stage, Shop, Prop House, Costume Lab, Faculty Offices, Restrooms and outdoor work areas.

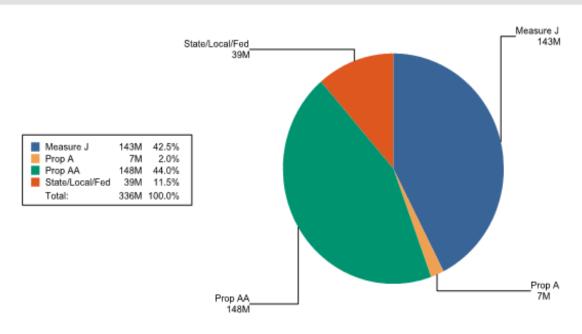

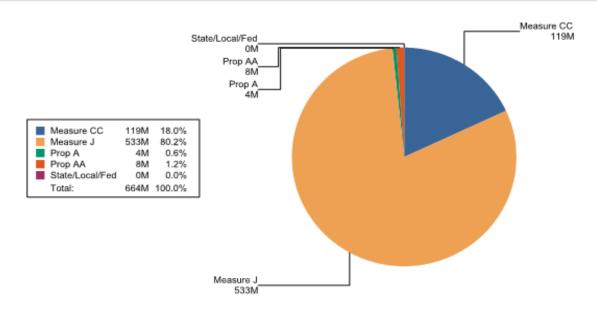

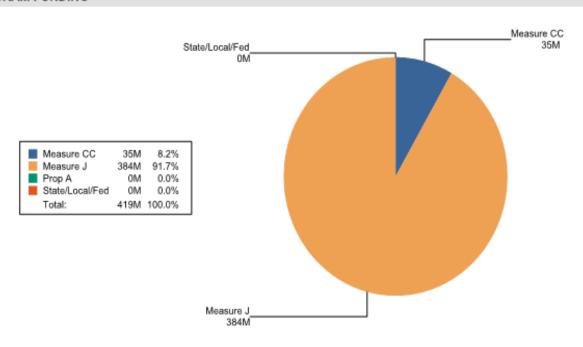
